

**Newer Drug Paraphernalia**

**WHAT DOES DRUG PARAPHERNALIA MEAN?**  
The term drug paraphernalia refers to any equipment that is used to produce, conceal, or consume illicit drugs. It includes but is not limited to items such as bongs, vaporizers, hookahs, roach clips, dabbers, pipes and more.<sup>1)</sup>

**WHAT DOES DRUG PARAPHERNALIA LOOK LIKE?**  
Identifying drug paraphernalia can be challenging because products are often designed and marketed to look like they are used for legitimate purposes.<sup>2)</sup>

**ARE DRUG PARAPHERNALIA ILLEGAL?**  
According to the U.S. Code Title 21 Section 863, drug paraphernalia are illegal. This statute makes it unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale drug paraphernalia. However, these products often carry a misleading disclaimer to circumvent the statute, such as stating they are intended to be used only with tobacco products (which are legal).

**WHAT SHOULD PARENTS AND SCHOOLS KNOW?**  
Vaporizers, vape pens, or e-cigarettes will likely have a heating element in an attempt to glamorize drug use and make products attractive to teenagers and young adults. Vaporizers, vape pens and e-cigarettes are newer marketed products that can hide a variety of drugs and allow the user to discreetly or secretly consume drugs with little to no detection from others.<sup>3)</sup>

**WHY ARE THESE ITEMS DIFFICULT TO DETECT?**  
These items can be difficult to detect as they are easy to conceal and they can be designed or disguised to look like pens, highlighters, cosmetics, cell phones, electronic gadgets, breathing inhalers, and more.<sup>4)</sup>

**HOW CAN YOU TELL IF IT IS DRUG PARAPHERNALIA OR NOT?**  
Vaporizers, vape pens, or e-cigarettes will likely have a heating element. Another way to know if it is drug paraphernalia is to search the internet for the item. "How to" videos about drug paraphernalia are often posted online.<sup>5)</sup>

**WHERE IS DRUG PARAPHERNALIA SOLD?**  
Drug paraphernalia can be obtained through various means. These products are often sold over the internet, mail-order businesses, tobacco shops, medical marijuana or retail stores, gas stations, and convenience stores.<sup>6)</sup>

In recent years, samples tested from law enforcement seizures have ranged approximately 12-37% THC, which is an increase of 300-800%.<sup>2)</sup> Marijuana edibles are often marketed to contain even higher levels of THC.<sup>3)</sup>

**WHAT IS THE EFFECT OF EATING MARIJUANA VERSUS SMOKING IT?**  
It only takes seconds to feel the effects of smoking marijuana and it lasts an hour or more to feel the effects of eating it. This is why people often end up eating more when they don't "feel high". Smoking marijuana delivers about 1mg of THC in one puff. If you ate 10 gummy bears, and each one is 10mg of THC, it would be like taking 20 hits of a marijuana cigarette at one time.<sup>4)</sup>

**CAN ANIMALS GET SICK OR DIE AFTER EATING MARIJUANA?**  
Yes.<sup>7)</sup>

**ARE MARIJUANA PRODUCTS PACKAGED WITH HEALTH WARNINGS?**  
Unlike tobacco, marijuana products are not required to have printed health warnings.<sup>8)</sup>

**HOW CAN I TELL IF IT'S MARIJUANA?**  
Check all packaging carefully. If a marijuana edibles is outside the packaging it can be very difficult to tell the difference. When in doubt, only consume a product you know to be safe.<sup>9)</sup>

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## Q&A

**Q: What are the criteria for licensed educational use of CLEAR Alliance's new 2021 TMEC Curriculum Kit?**

A: Educational licensed use of the TMEC curriculum kit is available for approved public-service agencies and its providers for public-service staff training, professional development, and for Instructors to teach TMEC to teens and adults in online or in-person classroom settings for its intended purpose. TMEC is geared for:

- Middle schools, high schools, and colleges (public, private, charter)
- Driver education programs
- Public health, prevention, treatment, and mental health agencies
- Hospitals, caregivers, doctor offices and clinics
- Juvenile Departments
- Law Enforcement agencies
- Athletic programs (public, private, charter) and after school programs
- Church/faith-based youth group & parenting group leaders
- Parenting class facilitators
- Public-service staff training and professional development

**Q: Is TMEC available for resale?**

A: No.

**Q: Who can teach TMEC under the licensed agency?**

A: Only the licensed agency and the licensed agency's trained TMEC Instructors may access and teach TMEC. TMEC Instructors must be 16 years of age and older, have completed the TMEC Instructor Training, and assigned their own Instructor Access. Individual access shall remain only with the licensed agency's designated TMEC Instructors. Access does not transfer to any person who quits or is terminated from the licensed agency. *\*For example: ABC School District may purchase a license for the TMEC curriculum and purchase instructor accesses for each assigned staff or youth leader to teach TMEC to students in ABC's middle and high schools.*

**Q: Does CLEAR Alliance offer a training for Instructors?**

A: Yes. Online TMEC Instructor trainings are available. TMEC Instructor training dates and registration information are posted on the CLEAR Alliance website. Instructions are also in the Instructor Login Portal.

**Q: Are completion certificates provided to TMEC Instructors who complete the TMEC Instructor training?**

A: Yes. CLEAR Alliance provides TMEC Instructors with a completion certificate with training hours listed. TMEC Instructors are responsible for submitting the completion certificate for continuing education credit as applicable and allowable by their own certification boards.

**Q: Will CLEAR Alliance travel to train a large group?**

A: Yes. Licensed agencies can request CLEAR Alliance trainers to travel to provide a group training. Travel and trainer costs are additional. Please contact [info@clearalliance.org](mailto:info@clearalliance.org) for a quote. *\*CLEAR Alliance must follow applicable COVID-19 restrictions.*

**Q: What about TMEC Instructors trained in 2019 or 2020 with the 2019 curriculum? What should they do?**

A: Between January and June 2021, current TMEC Instructors trained in the 2019 TMEC curriculum may contact CLEAR Alliance to participate in the 2021 TMEC Instructor Recertification Promotion.
