Dr. Tamara D. Herold is returning after positive reviews from the 2021 Fall Conference; however, her OEDI presentation will bring new information with a slightly different focus.

Dr. Herold received her Ph.D. in criminal justice from the University of Cincinnati. She uses the crime science perspective to study the criminogenic impact of the design and management of places, and crowd dynamics that lead to violence. Her research and teaching projects involve working with police, private security, and stadium/venue operators. She has authored scholarly articles, books, technical reports, and problem-oriented policing guides sponsored by the U.S. Department of Justice. Read More
